Aims of the programme

The MSc Accounting programme provides a flexible approach to programme delivery which reflects the needs and expectations of our current undergraduate business and accountancy students. The MSc Accounting Programme will:

- 1. Provide students with a systematic understanding of the tools and techniques of accounting and financial analysis.
- 2. Enable students to gain a critical understanding of the principal research traditions and research methods used in accountancy and financial strategy.
- 3. Develop a critical awareness of the principles and techniques needed for effective financial decision making.
- 4. Develop student's ability to apply knowledge and a critical understanding by undertaking a research project in an area of accounting or financial strategy in the global business context
- 5. Develop a comprehensive understanding of research techniques applicable to accounting and financial strategy which will enable students to continue on to doctoral work should they so choose.
- 6. Develop an in depth knowledge of contiguous disciplines such as accounting, business ethics, social responsibility, information systems and information technology.
- 7. Develop knowledge and skills in the application of concepts, techniques, methods and approaches in accounting and financial strategy, within organisational and managerial contexts.
- 8. Development of the ability to apply knowledge and understanding of accountancy and strategy to complex issues, both systematically and creatively, to improve business performance.
- Enhancement of lifelong learning and transferable skills and personal development so as to be able to work with self-direction and originality and to contribute to business, the professions and society at large.

Distinctive features of the programme

All modules are delivered in 'Block Mode' and follow the successful partnership model already adopted with ISTT:

- 50% of lectures/workshops are delivered as a block of two days by a UoB Tutor
- 50% are delivered by Local Tutors
- Additional remote support is provided by Bolton staff through the Moodle virtual learning environment (VLE) which is used extensively in course delivery.

Learning and teaching strategies

Role of external examiners

External examiners are appointed for all programmes of study. They oversee the assessment process and their duties include: approving assessment tasks, reviewing assessment marks, attending assessment boards and reporting to the University on the assessment process.
